Historical Bits

George W. Perkins

If you've ever been stuck in outbound traffic on the George Washington Bridge, as most of us have, you've had time to admire the great cliffs of the Palisades. In large measure we can thank George W. Perkins, a member of the South Side Sportsmen's Club, for the preservation of what are now Palisades Interstate Park and Bear Mountain and Harriman State Parks.

Born in 1862, Perkins rose from a high-school-educated office boy for New York Life to vice president of the company by 1898. A proponent of the Efficiency Movement, he streamlined the way insurance was sold, eliminating middlemen, instituting incentives, and making local agents company employees.

For park lovers, however, his greatest accomplishments were yet to come. Southern parts of the Palisades across from Manhattan has already been quarried to extinction for "traprock," the basalt building material for the burgeoning metropolis. New Jersey and New York, in a move to stop further destruction of the Palisades, formed the Palisades Interstate Park Commission. In 1900, Governor Teddy Roosevelt appointed Perkins as its head.



The Commission was charged with raising private funds for land acquisition. Where to look first? Perkins chose J.P. Morgan, who offered to put up the entire goal of \$125,000 on one condition: that Perkins would come to work with Morgan. Perkins agreed, and the mining stopped. The Commission ultimately acquired the riverfront Palisades from Fort Lee, New Jersey to Stony Point, New York.

By 1901 Perkins was working for Morgan, negotiating complex business deals and restructuring U.S. Steel. Perkins later



became involved in forming Teddy Roosevelt's Progressive Party, but deep divisions over his opposition to antitrust programs (after all, he partnered with Morgan) led to the party's disintegration.

In 1909, New York State purchased land on what is now Bear Mountain State Park. Perkins then arranged a gift of ten thousand acres and one million dollars from Union Pacific Railroad president E.H. Harriman. Other wealthy benefactors came forward, and the state put up \$2.5 million. Thus was born a spectacular and unprecedented interstate complex of state parks. Today, visit Bear Mountain and you'll find Perkins Memorial Drive and the Perkins Tower atop the peak.

One last note: in 1903 Perkins bought Wave Hill House in the Bronx, now open to the public as a botanical garden.

FOC's own Richard Remmer, who is currently a New York State Park Commissioner, notes, "I am overwhelmed by what he accomplished. He set a bar that none of us in this era will ever attain. His efforts on behalf of New York state parks, including the Palisades and Harriman State Park, are—to put it in a word—extraordinary." Our thanks to FOC board member Keith Snedecor for researching Perkins' life.


Out and About in the Park

10 Miles of Track: Islip to Patchogue LIRR Stations Presented by David Morrison

Sunday, November 13, 2022, 1:00 PM at Connetquot River State Park Preserve

LIRR historian and author David Morrison will discuss the story behind the weathervane at Islip Station, the anomaly at Great River Station, the brief history of the Club House Station, the wedding station, Blue Point's sister station building and Patchogue's demolished signal tower. Hear about the connection between the former Bayport Station building and the South Side Sportsmen's clubhouse. Of course, President Theodore Roosevelt's fondness of the Sportsmen's Club and the Long Island Rail Road will be discussed.





In 1870, Club House Station was created as a flag stop to serve patrons visiting the nearby South Side Sportsmen's Club. A small box-type building was constructed between what are now the Great River and Oakdale Stations. In the style often utilized by the South Side Rail Road, large lettering was placed on the sides of the building, as shown in this 1878 photograph taken by George Brainerd. The building was demolished when the stop was removed from the timetable in 1885.

About Our Speaker

David Morrison is a retired Long Island Rail Road branch line manager who has a passion for the history of the railroad. He is the author of 9 books in the Images of Rail series of Arcadia Publications. He is a charter member of the Railroad Museum of Long Island and he is on the station restoration committee of the Oyster Bay Railroad Museum. He is a longtime member of the Long Island Sunrise Trail Chapter of the National Railway Historical Society. He has given countless presentations to libraries and historical societies and continues to do so.

Lectures are free for members of Friends of Connetquot. Non-members pay \$5/person. Seasonal parking rates apply.

On Saturday, June 18th the crew of Andy Mirchel; from Save the Great South Bay, Creek Defenders, along with Mark and Janet Soley, Louis Daquila, Bob Simmons and York Moosemuller, all from The Friends of Connetquot, joined David Reisfield, L.I. Greenbelt Trail Conference President and FOC board member, to create a floating boardwalk in a very muddy area known as Dismal Swamp on the L.I. Greenbelt Trail on the north side of Connetquot River State Park Preserve. The walkway was created using a discarded 19-foot aluminum ladder with planks bolted to it and treads screwed into the planks. In our previous issue we happily announced that the Friends of Connetquot had received a \$41,000 grant from the State Environmental Protection Fund's Park and Trail Partnership program in conjunction with Parks and Trails New York. The funds will be used to create an Educational Interpretive Center and other improvements at the Connetquot trout hatchery.

On a beautiful afternoon on June 29, PTNY board members and state officials gathered at the hatchery to help us celebrate as the Friends accepted a literally large check. (Yes, it was symbolic; the real check is on the way.) Speaker after speaker sung the praises of Connetquot Park Preserve's rich history and natural beauty and how deserving it is of financial support such as this grant. They also stressed the importance of volunteer groups such as FOC. We thank all who attended, with special thanks going to Richard Remmer, who supplied generous refreshments for the day. And bravo, Janet Soley, for your grant-writing work!

As we mentioned before, remember that there's a catch: these Partnership Grants must be matched in part with private and local funding. 
of being taped! Without getting into a lot of details, I'd like to tell you about our first three "Video Rock Stars"!


